Isn't that what we all want; to be seen, to be known, and hopefully, to be remembered? Those chapters between the main story are something you discover about Inez, but her family never finds out.

Family patterns are a complicated thing; for good and bad. I realized, as many of us do, that habits and personality traits can be passed down as easily as a love for fried chicken. Writing about that intersection between Inez, July, and AJ seemed a fitting way to explore the ways I've repeated patterns in my family life, too. Maybe you have, also. Really, I wanted to give tribute to the grey-headed, hunched back people we overlook every day—our older generation. They all lived interesting lives and if we don't stop and explore that, we're doomed to the fate of invisibility in broad daylight.

On a lighter note, I also am a closet lavender farmer. Every spring I buy a new plant, attempt a new spot in my yard, and almost every year face the inevitable demise of lavender to either shade, rain, or pests. My fantasies of bringing in bunches of lavender to arrange around my house are just that—illusions. AJ is a woman who routinely puts others ahead of herself. In watching her develop, could you relate to her struggles? Her inability to "let go?" What can you do to lighten up your responsibilities?

Though the characters of Roger and July were hard to love, what did you find about them that would give them redemption?
