Haven't you ever wondered what happens to these larger-than-life athletes once the spotlight fades? My nod to the very real Earl Campbell was a mea culpa regarding all those who walked in fame and then lived the rest of their lives in the shadows.

Many have asked about the side story plot of the sheet music, the Rose Festival, and Black musicians in East Texas. There is a lot to unpack and one novel won't due all those categories justice. It's worth your time to delve into the archives of your preferred library and explore the real people at the center of these institutions. Though not being a musician, or Black, I did have to guess at some of the characterizations. In the few pages on which this secondary story rolled out, I hope it did everyone justice.

Anna had to deal with a high-school rape, an over-developed body, social tensions, absentee mother, and a brain that was too smart for its own good. She may have handled things different from you, in that situation, but how did you learn to recover from youthful traumas?

It was beginning to feel like Anna would never catch a break. A single mom on the run, hiding from her family, living hand-to-mouth, hiding her backstory from friends, dealing with strong-minded twin daughters; it was a lot to process. Then a dream job lands in her lap. What would be your dream job and how might it change your outlook on life?

There are a lot of women in Anna's life and she's kept them at arm's length, but the bonds of friendship seeped behind her armor. Have you had friends that wouldn't stop at the curb, but loved you enough to see behind the mask? How has that changed you for the better?

Jack Moses is a noble man. He and his best friend, Jo Jo Green, are the type of men we admire, but even with all that he has, Jack is lonely. Don't we assume that folks who appear to have it all going on are perfect? How can we be more perceptive of people we meet?

It's easy to think that a two-parent household is the single-woman's dream come true, but that is not always the case. How do women parent when there is not a reliable male figure in the family?

Do you have a skill set—like car repair—that your friends admire?

Organizing fundraisers is hard work and complicated. A million things can go wrong. Have you ever had to plan an unusual event for a cause and then—fingers crossed—that it would all turn out the way you'd hoped? Tell your friends, because they're bound to walk that path one day, also.

Education processes are in flux. The traditional model may not hold up well to a modern age. I so enjoyed learning more about charter schools, running a private school, and the ever-present need for more funding. Let's all keep an open mind toward the way children learn best and the systems for how education can best be delivered.
